

Bradley C. Hosmer, the first graduate to serve as the Superintendent of the Academy, opened the exhibit on 17 April with a presentation on the history of the Academy and the significance of the exhibit. Distinguished visitors at the opening included the Acting Secretary of the Air Force, F. Whitten Peters; Superintendent of the USAF Academy, Lt. Gen. Tad Oelstrom; members of the original staff of the Academy; and members of the USAFA Class of 1959. The

exhibit was featured in an article in the Academy Spirit and received local television coverage from station KRDO. Work has begun with the Office of Public Affairs to place segments of the exhibit on the Internet. The Association of Graduates has requested the reproduction of a part of the exhibit for display at Doolittle Hall and for use as a traveling exhibit by various chapters of the AOG throughout the U.S.

Since our last *Newsletter* in March, our work in support of the Director of Academy Libraries and his staff has proceeded rapidly. The manuscript for the Gimbel Catalogue is now in the hands of the publisher. Editing and proofing of galleys will probably continue through he end of the year. Our annual luncheon in May was well attended and our speaker was our Superintendent, Lt. General Tad Oelstrom. Contributions made by our Friends membership have been faithful and generous and for this we are very grateful.

The work of our loyal and hard-working executive committee has made my task a very enjoyable experience and I should add that our relations with the Library Director, Dr. Scott, makes us feel that we are valuable members of his team. Clearly, the high point of this year's program was the Spring exhibit. It has generated wide interest and is being introduced onto the Academy's Internet.

FOGLEMAN COLLECTION

At the request of The Friends of the Air Force Academy Library, General Ronald R. Fogleman has donated a comprehensive documentary collection of his official records and personal papers to the Academy Library. The Collection, which will chronicle General Fogleman's military career from his activities as a member of the Academy's Class of 1963 through his service as the Chief of Staff of the Air Force, will be a significant archival resource for cadet and scholarly research. On 3 September, the Academy Archivist, Mr. Duane Reed, arranged for the shipment of the first segment of the papers from the General's residence to the Special Collections Branch of the Library. The Collection will be closed for research until the records have been described, arranged, and an archival finding aid prepared by the staff of the Special Collections Branch.


GIMBEL CATALOGUE UPDATE

In the last edition of the Newsletter, we reported on the progress of the Gimbel Catalogue and included a tentative time table for completion of the project. As with all complex endeavors, the schedule has slipped a bit. We are told that this is normal in the book publishing business so it is not a matter of concern. We found that there was some additional editing that had to be done before we could proceed beyond the first draft of the page proofs and that has taken a considerable amount of time. That task has now been completed and, by the time you read this update, we expect to have the next page proofs in our hands. The book will not be ready to ship by the end of this year, but we are hoping that next summer is a reasonable target. We are all learning a lot about the publishing business as we go along and remain convinced that the final product will be an extraordinary volume.

Last April we also mentioned our hope that the Smithsonian Institution's Traveling Exhibit Service (SITES) would be interested in the Gimbel Collection for possible use in their series of exhibits leading up to the 100th anniversary of the Wright Brothers flight. We are in contact with the Smithsonian and they are presently evaluating the possible use of the Collection in this regard. The University of Washington Press plans to display a prototype of the Gimbel Catalogue at the October International Book Fair in Frankfurt, Germany.

GENERAL WADE PAPERS

A comprehensive collection of photographs, official reports, personal correspondence, diaries, maps and printed matter, which graphically depicts the "Round the World Flight of 1924" has been received from the estate of Mr. Cole Morrow. Mr. Morrow, friend and confidant of Major General Leigh Wade, gathered the material in support of his extensive effort to produce a biography of General Wade and the General's experience as a member of the crew of the "Round the World Flight." The Collection was donated to The Friends by Mrs. Christine Lubs and Mrs. Phyllis Kramer, co-conservators of the Morrow estate. The material will be housed within the Academy Library's Special Collections Branch where it will be made available for cadet and scholarly research.

EXCERPTS FROM GENERAL HOSMER'S TALK

"The Academy is fundamentally different from other military organizations because here the core task—to develop superb Air Force officers—has not changed over the past 40 years. I believe a superb officer would be recognizable—and an effective leader—in any historic period. Officership and leadership remain the same so long as people and units are pulled together, and pulled up, by the same qualities in their leaders."

"The Cadet Wing is so much bigger the difference is more than quantity. When we moved to this site in the summer of 1958, the Cadet Wing was around 700. The new class entering here, the Class of '62, brought the entire Cadet Wing up to about 1100. In recent years, single new classes have entered as many as 1604 new cadets. In those early years, we knew all our classmates. The class was the center of loyalty. Today, squadron loyalties are, of necessity, dominant; class loyalties emerge only later."

"Forty years ago our elders were hopeful that someday the Academy would become a national institution. They invested top talent from across the Air Force to achieve it. Speaking as one who returned to the Academy after a 32-year gap, it took some months to sort out what had changed from what had not changed in that time. I believe the hope of our founders has been achieved. The Academy is an institution, because the most important aspects of the Academy, those that mold superb officers, have become permanent."

Since mid-1992, The Friends has offered an attractive memorial program which has appealed to military personnel and civilians alike and especially to World War II Army Air Force veterans. Through The Friends they now can honor individuals or crews by having a certificate for the honoree placed in a handsome Honor Book on display in the Air Force Academy Library. This feature has an appeal to those who wish to remember military dependents or close associates. The Memorial Program also has a broad appeal to those who wish to remember non-military personnel.

Another part of the program allows a donor to purchase books in which a book plate is inserted bearing the name of an intended honoree. Individuals may be honored in this way.

A donation of \$50 or more will purchase either type of memorial. Donations made without specific request for books or certificates will be used to meet essential Library needs that federal disbursements do not cover. All donations will help the

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WILLIAM GLEN CLARK, SR. LT. COLONEL, U. S. AIR FORCE 1921 - 1998

Bill Clark served as an officer in the 13th Air Force in the South Pacific from 1942 to 1945. After the war he earned degrees in English at the University of Iowa. He was recalled to active duty in May, 1951, taught at the Air Force Academy and served as one of the English Department's first Tenure Associate Professors. After retirement, he taught at the University of Iowa retiring as an Associate Professor Emeritus. He was a man of quiet reason, respected by all for his thoughtful manner and fair-minded decisions. A faithful husband, a devoted father, a Socratic teacher, and a valued friend.
